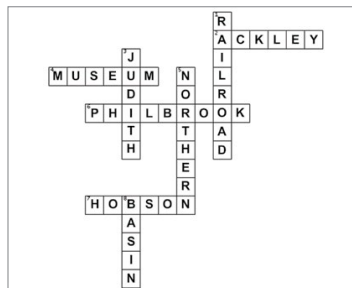
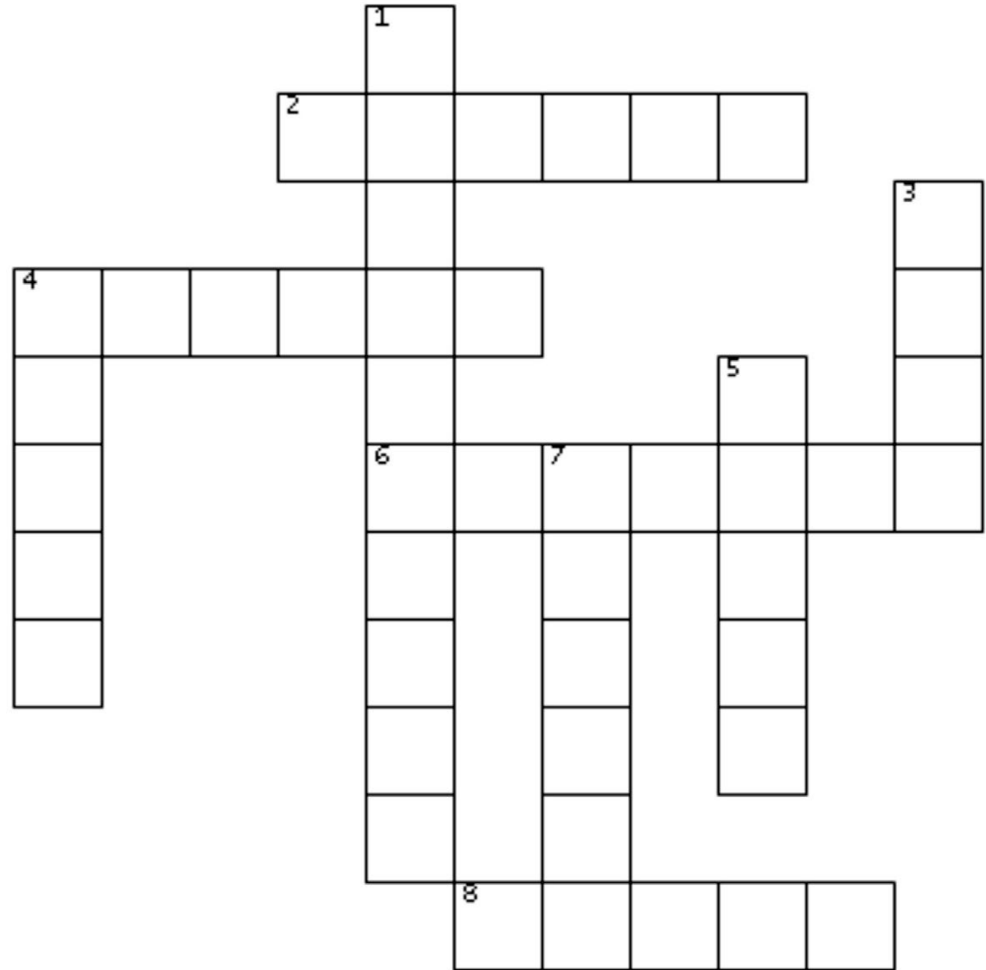

RECIPE

Crunchy Pea Salad

From HCE/Triangle Cooking for a Cure Cookbook

INGREDIENTS

1 (16 oz.) pkg frozen peas, thawed
2 cups chopped cauliflower
1 cup diced celery
¼ cup chopped green onion
¾ cup chopped cashews
Combine the above ingredients in a medium bowl except the cashews.

Dressing Option 1

¾ cup fat-free mayonnaise
2 Tbsp. sugar
½ Tbsp. vinegar

Dressing Option 2

½ cup mayonnaise
¼ cup ranch salad dressing
1 Tbsp. sugar

DIRECTIONS

Combine ingredients for whichever dressing you prefer in a small mixing bowl. Fold into pea mixture and top with cashews before serving.

RECIPE

Banana Chocolate Cup Cakes

INGREDIENTS

Sift into a 2-quart bowl:
1 ¼ cup sifted flour
¾ cup plus 2 Tbsp sugar
¼ tsp. salt
Add all at once:
1/3 cup soft shortening
½ cup mashed ripe banana
3 Tbsp sego or evaporated milk
1 Tbsp water
1 tsp. vanilla

DIRECTIONS

Beat hard for 2 minutes with mixing spoon or with an electric mixer at medium speed. Add and beat hard 2 minutes longer:

1 egg

Stir in:

2/3 cup chocolate chips
½ cup chopped nuts

Pour batter into muffin cups, filling no more than half full. Bake on oven rack slightly above center about 20 minutes, or until cakes pull away from sides of cups. Remove from cups at once. Cool. Frost with chocolate frosting if desired, but they are good as they are.

RECIPE

Ratatouille Bake

From HCE/Triangle Cooking for a Cure Cookbook

INGREDIENTS

1 Tbsp. olive oil
5 cloves garlic, minced
2 cups eggplant, peeled and diced
2 cups zucchini, chopped
1 green pepper, chopped
½ cup carrots, sliced
1 cup mushrooms, sliced
1 (14-1/2 oz) can diced tomatoes

Spinach, optional
1 Tbsp. dried parsley
1 Tbsp. dried basil
½ tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1 (8 oz.) package frozen cheese ravioli
1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350°. Heat the olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat; cook and stir in the garlic, onion and eggplant until eggplant softens. Stir in zucchini, green peppers, tomatoes, carrots, mushrooms, spinach, salt, pepper and dried spices. Bring to a boil; stirring frequently. Reduce heat to medium low and simmer until vegetables are tender. Cook the ravioli according to package directions. Layer ravioli in the bottom of a 2 ½ quart baking dish. Spoon the vegetables over the ravioli and sprinkle with cheese. Bake for about 20 minutes or until casserole is bubbling and cheese is melted.

The exchanges upgrading to fiber this year are South Chester, Geraldine and additional projects around Big Timber. Triangle has hired contractors to plow the fiber and work on other aspects of these construction projects. The contractors working for Triangle are required to have

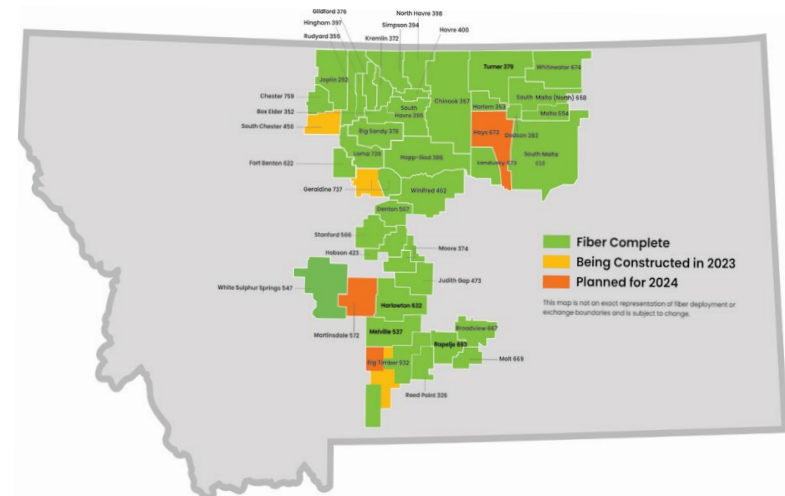
their company name and/or Triangle magnets on their vehicles. All the contractors are required to have ID badges with their photo, name, and name of the contractor they work for.

Triangle did pre-installs in the exchanges being upgraded to fiber. Once the techs install the fiber and connect it to the pre-installed equipment, your fiber service should be up and running. The pre-installs will make the connection of the fiber plowed into the locations easier and faster.

The number of devices in any given home continues to grow and the need for increased internet speeds will continue to rise. We understand access to fast internet is important for all our members whether you are working from home, doing online schooling, gaming or just keeping up with the family and your community. Fiber technology allows us to provide faster speeds to support all your internet needs.

Triangle is already preparing for our 2024 projects in Hays/Lodgepole, Springdale and Martinsdale. Our Engineering team will be contacting members to obtain right-of-way easements for the fiber placement in these areas soon. You will also see our engineering crews staking the routes soon for the fiber being plowed next year.

Thank you to our members for your patience and understanding as we continue our fiber upgrades. Stay Safe and Stay Healthy!

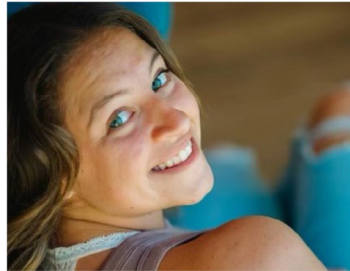

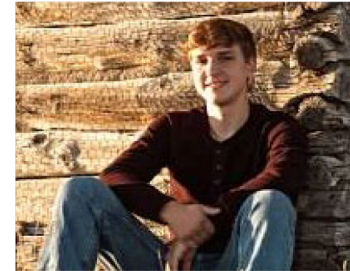

Be sure to stop by Thistle Creek while strolling through town to relax in their magical outdoor courtyard and enjoy a warm cup of coffee from Yellowstone Coffee or a cup of tea from Tumblewood Teas and a slice of warm, delicious pie from Montana Pie Company. Feel free to grab a to-go meal from any restaurant in Big Timber and stop in the Courtyard as well!

Take a stroll into the laid-back 1930s atmosphere of Cole Drug. Established in 1935, they feature an old-fashioned soda fountain where you can sit back while waiting for your prescription or stroll in for a leisurely milkshake or Root Beer Float. They also have pancakes, cinnamon rolls for breakfast, and sandwiches such as Reubens, Club, and BLTs for lunch.

INTERNET TIPS AND POWER SUPPLY INFORMATION

POWER CYCLE YOUR ROUTER

If you are having trouble with your internet, before calling in, you can try power cycling your router. To do so, disconnect the power cable from the back of the router, leave it unplugged for 30 seconds and then plug it back in.

Give your router about 5 minutes to reboot, once all the lights are back on the router, try your internet again. Sometimes this may resolve your issue. If not, please give us a call at 1-800-332-1201.

GENERAL INTERNET TROUBLESHOOTING TIPS

If you are experiencing issues with your phone/internet, here are some things to try to resolve most issues:

- Disconnect the power from the router and wait 30 seconds before reconnecting.
- Make sure the phone line from the router is firmly plugged into the jack and router.
- If on copper, make sure that there is a filter on all devices plugged into phone jacks including: phones, answering machines, fax machines, satellites, etc. except modem/router.
- If on copper and using a splitter/filter be sure that cord from router is plugged into the DSL side of the splitter.
- If on copper, try bypassing the splitter and plugging the line from the router directly into the phone jack.

- If on fiber optics or using a separate modem, try bypassing the router and plugging the computer directly into the ethernet cable coming from the wall.
- For wireless information including SSID (Wireless connection name) and security key or passphrase look at the bottom, side, or back of the router, (depending on the model). There is usually a sticker that contains that information as well as the public IP, the router's IP and log in information.
- Be sure to have the PC connected directly to the router/modem with an ethernet cable and disconnect all other devices before running the test.
- Do Not Press the Reset Button on the back of the router. (Paperclip in reset hole). If you have pressed the reset button on the router, contact tech support to help reprogram the router.

UNDERSTANDING THE LIGHTS ON YOUR CYBER POWER BATTERY BACKUP

If you are in a fiber location, you will have a cyber power box inside your house. If your phone/internet are out, this is one of the first things that should be checked. It is a white colored box, usually mounted on your wall, and plugged into a power outlet. Check and make sure it is plugged into a working power outlet.

Depending on the model of cyber power you have, it will display different lights on it. On either model,

if the light is not lit up or is a different color, or the battery light is red, check and make sure the power supply is plugged in to a working outlet that has power for sure.



If it is working properly and getting good power from a working outlet, the System Status (far right) light should be lit up green and the others should be off.



If it is working properly and getting good power from a working outlet, the AC and Output lights should both be lit up green, and the others should be off.
