

RECIPE

Broccoli Swiss Cheese Frittata

INGREDIENTS

- 1 Tbsp butter
- 2 cups broccoli florets
- 8 eggs
- 6 oz. shredded swiss cheese

DIRECTIONS

Saute broccoli in butter until tender. Whip eggs in a bowl, mix in cheese. Put broccoli in a baking dish. Pour egg mixture over broccoli. Bake 350° for 25 minutes. Let cool 10 minutes before cutting.

RECIPE

Hot Fudge Pudding Cake

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup flour
- 34 cup sugar
- 2 Tbsp cocoa
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- ½ cup milk
- 2 Tbsp shortening, melted
- 1 cup brown sugar
- ¼ cup cocoa
- 1 34 cup hot water

DIRECTIONS

Combine flour, sugar, 2 Tbsp cocoa, baking powder and salt in a bowl. Blend in milk and shortening. Pour into an ungreased 9x9x2 pan. Stir together brown sugar and ¼ cup cocoa. Sprinkle over batter. Pour hot water over batter. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes. Best served warm.

RECIPE

Hurricane Oatmeal Cake

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup oatmeal
- 1 1/4 cups boiling water
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- 1 ½ cups flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp cinnamon

DIRECTIONS

Combine oatmeal and boiling water; set aside. Beat together eggs, sugars and oil until well blended. Add sifted flour, baking soda, salt and cinnamon. Then add oatmeal mixture. Pour into greased 9"x 13" cake pan. Bake at 350° for 30-35 minutes. Could sprinkle with powdered sugar after baking. This cake stays moist and fresh for several days.

ARE YOU ON THE LIST?

Who has time for unwanted telemarketing calls? If you have not already, you may want to register your landline and mobile phones on the National Do Not Call Registry (www.donotcall.gov). If you are already registered and are still receiving calls, you can verify your registration at the same website.

Registered numbers are removed from telemarketing and company call lists. Telemarketers must access the registry database and remove all numbers from their call lists. Unless you remove your number from the registry, numbers are on the list permanently and it does not expire.

It is easy and free to register at www.donotcall.gov or call 1-800-382-1222 from the number you want to register. It may take up to eight weeks to see a reduction in those pesky calls.

Montana is a state rich in basketball history and a source of community pride. The young ladies that live in our cooperative footprint are in a class unto themselves!

Class A, B and C Girls' State Championships were all won by schools in Triangle's service area. These young athletes sacrifice a lot and spend an enormous amount of time together required to be a championship team. Years of developing skills, playing as a team in tournaments outside of the normal season, basketball camps, open gyms, weightlifting, etc. The commitment for development of future teams through volunteering at Saturday morning elementary basketball. These championship teams are no longer spending just a few months in the gym, it takes a year-round commitment to achieve the level of success we are seeing throughout our service area.

For these athletes, it isn't all about basketball either. They balance their schoolwork on top of their basketball commitments. It had been 40 years since the Big Timber Lady Sheepherders brought home their last state championship in basketball. They not only brought home the Class B championship trophy, but they dominated every game of the season finishing with a perfect undefeated season at 24 wins and 0 loses. They met a tough competitor in the Malta M-Ettes on Friday night in the semi-finals. M-Ettes, another great group of young athletes in the Triangle service area. The Malta M-Ettes finished the state tournament in 4th place.

The Fort Benton Lady Longhorns finished the season with their first ever state championship. The Lady Longhorns went undefeated in the regular Class C season play and had lost to Class A Havre and the district Championship game to North Star in overtime (another great Triangle service area team). Only to play the North Stars again in the divisional Championship to determine the team who would automatically go to state; this time defeating the North Star team. The Lady Longhorns went on to the State Tournament and never looked back; beating each team they faced by several points to win the State Class C title.

Important Information Regarding Montana Relay

Montana Relay:

Montana Relay is a public service that guarantees all citizens access to prompt, professional and accurate communication through a telephone. Consumers of these specialized services, specifically individuals who are deaf, deaf-blind, hard of hearing or have difficulty speaking, can communicate on the telephone via TTY, Voice Carry Over (VCO), Hearing Carry Over (HCO), Speech-to-Speech (STS), Spanish and Captioned Telephone. This helps ensure the ability to connect with family, friends or businesses with ease.

How Montana Relay works:

Dial 711 or the toll-free number listed below to connect with Montana Relay. A qualified Communication Assistant (CA) will ask for the area code and the number of the person you wish to call and will begin relaying the conversation. Generally, the CA will voice the typed message from the text telephone (TTY) user to the person on the other end. The CA then relays the spoken words by typing them back to the TTY user.

Specialized Services:

Montana Relay offers specialized services for individuals who have difficulty speaking, including Spanish-speaking residents. Specially trained CAs are on hand to assist in these types of calls by dialing the associated number provided on this page. Since Montana Relay offers a variety of services please refer to the website listed or call Montana Relay Customer Care for more detailed instruction on how a particular call is processed.

Captioned Telephone:

Captioned Telephone is ideal for any individual that has a loss of hearing but is still able to speak for themselves. A captioned telephone works like any other telephone with one essential difference: it allows users to listen to their phone conversations while reading captions of what's said to them.

Access to Services:

Both 711 and the 800 numbers are toll free calls and provide access to the same relay services. If you are experiencing trouble dialing 711 when trying to reach Montana Relay, please call Montana Relay Customer Care.

All TRS and English Captioned Telephone services are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Spanish Captioned Telephone is available daily from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. MST. Consumers may place relay calls to English-speaking and Spanish-speaking people within Montana, across the United States and even internationally. Each conversation is handled with strict confidentiality.

I think we are all tired of talking and hearing about it. Hopefully with the vaccines we can get back to some semblance of normal soon.

You will see our second capital credit article on the next page; please review it to have a better understanding of our capital credits and how many options there are to the cooperative on how they can be retired (paid) out. Triangle will also have a video soon on our website that does a good job of also talking about capital credits. I will let you know when it is posted.

Triangle is getting ready to start construction on our 2021 fiber upgrades. This year we have hired VECI and JKL for our Fiber to the Home construction. JKL will be plowing fiber in the South Malta exchange area north of Malta and Molt in the southern area of our exchanges. VECI will finish up plowing fiber in the Stanford exchange and will also be plowing fiber in the Denton exchange. In addition to those four exchanges, we will also upgrade another portion of the Big Timber exchange.

I invite you to look at our Fiber to the Home map on our website,

https://www.itstriangle.com/services/misc/triangle-fiber. It shows exchanges already upgraded to fiber, the areas being constructed in 2021 and what we have planned for in the future.

We are excited to be bringing fiber to our service area and the new and exciting opportunities fiber can provide. These projects take a lot of planning and it really is a team effort with our Engineering team, Construction teams, our leadership team and good solid direction given by the Board working together to provide exceptional service to our members.

The cooperative and the union have reached agreement on a new contract. I want to thank all the union employees who gave their input, and we have a good contract supported by the IBEW union, the membership of the union and the cooperative.

Last but definitely not least; I would like to take this opportunity to thank our employees for their hard work during these uncertain times. The cooperative will have employees return to the office on May 10th and we will continue to monitor the issue as we move forward. The office will not open to our members until sometime later, please look to Facebook and our website or the next newsletter for any updates.

RETIRING CAPITAL CREDITS

Triangle Telephone Cooperative Association, Inc., was founded in 1953 and used the cooperative model. The cooperative model is not an investment tool for members, but a way to provide an essential community-based service at reasonable cost.

Members of a cooperative are charged for services based on current rates and pay for those service used on a monthly basis. During the following year, after the external financial audit is completed, and if positive margins are made from the services that directly relate to the members of the cooperative (not necessarily paid by the member, remember the last article about the universal service fund), those positive margins are called capital credits or patronage.

When the cooperative has cash created by the positive margins, the Board of Trustees decides annually if the margins will be invested back into plant and operations or if it will be used to retire capital credits (pay out) to current and previous members through a retirement process. Yes, the Board of Trustees can elect to not retire any capital credits if they feel there are other uses for the dollars collected by the cooperative that are needed for the betterment of the cooperative as a whole, this is part of the Trustee's fiduciary duty.

If the retirement process is going to be utilized by the cooperative, the board has several different ways in which to retire the capital patronage (equity) of the cooperative to the members. They can select the oldest year, the most current year, a combination of years, pay a certain amount of dollars spread over a selected number of years, retire estates only, include estates for the past year in addition to the years selected, offer the retirement based upon the discounted present value of dollars collected over time of the capital credits, and/or other ways not mentioned here.

As you can see, the Board of Trustees has many ways to retire the capital credits and makes that determination every year. The Trustees decide on the financial health of the organization, not only today but into the future, as this is also part of their fiduciary duty.

In the past, Triangle has been able to retire a portion of the oldest

capital credits and then a percentage of the remaining years. These retirements were in addition to the estates that are retired when a member passes away. Calculations in 2020 and Triangle's 3-year average of just the estates retired, is approximately \$1.5 million per year in addition to broader retirement annually. This equates to typically, between \$2 and \$3 Million per year.

In 2020, the Board of Trustees offered a discounted retirement as well as continued to retire estates. One of the reasons for the discounted retirement was due to the Universal Service Funds (USF funds) driving our capital credits balances to new highs. The discounted retirement was an effort to get a handle on the growth of patronage added annually from the sheer amount of USF funds being calculated into the positive net income annually. As covered in the last article, the USF funds being calculated into the patronage are not funds that come from members.

The Board of Trustees was unsure if the discounted retirement of capital credits would be successful. The Trustees did not know if there was going to be an additional retirement as had been completed in years past. Since this was unknown, the Trustees did not announce that there would or would not be an additional retirement of capital credits. The Trustees wanted to make sure that as many people as possible could take advantage of the discounted retirement without the added confusion of another retirement possibly later in the year. Given the results of the discounted retirement offer after it was calculated, the cooperative retired over \$31 million in capital credits and paid out over \$7 million in cash to its members in 2020. Approximately 30% of the membership decided to participate in the discounted retirement offer. This was a success for the cooperative as it has helped the outlook of the cooperative by bringing down the total capital credit (equity) balance and provided dollars to our members at an unprecedented amount.

What will the Trustees do in the future? That is not known as the Trustees will have some very tough decisions in the future about how capital credits are retired. The Trustees will continue to make the best decision for the cooperative if and when they are able to retire capital credits.
